In a year that our community has faced so much uncertainty, PCYC has been at the forefront, assisting our young people, as they have been for almost 80 years, be it during wartime or in the current global COVID-19 pandemic.

PCYC has continued in the most difficult of circumstances to keep our most at risk and disadvantaged young people engaged, trained and healthy through a raft of learning, sporting and diversionary programs.

The McGowan Government is proud to support PCYC. To assist the efforts of PCYC, the McGowan Government has continued to provide sustainability funding to PCYC and has contributed funding for the redevelopment and facility upgrade of the Carnarvon PCYC that is currently underway.

Work is also progressing with funding provided by the McGowan Government for the establishment of the PCYC facility in Kununurra and for expansion and upgrades to the Midland and Rockingham Centres. Stage One of the \$1.3 million Broome-based West Kimberley Youth and Resilience Hub is also a priority.

As Police Minister it has been a privilege to travel around the state, from the metropolitan area to the regional districts, to see firsthand the benefits and opportunities that are being provided to our young people through a range of programs offered by PCYC.

I would like to thank the CEO, President, Board, staff and volunteers of PCYC for their efforts in ensuring our most vulnerable young people continue to have both support and a safe space when they need it.

# MESSAGE FROM THE PATRON

I am confident that together we will continue to change the lives of young people in WA for the better, reducing crime and creating safer, more harmonious communities. As Commissioner of the Western Australia Police Force and Patron of the Federation of Western Australian Police and Community Youth Centres, I am committed to driving better outcomes for young people and creating a safer community for all West Australians.

Significant research and evidence exist to demonstrate that diverting young people away from the justice system can result in lower rates of repeat offending.

The partnership between the WA Police Force and WA PCYC is crucial in achieving this goal. Through working together with local communities, we aim to identify and deliver effective diversionary programs and intervention activities for young people who are most at risk of offending.

In mid-2019, the WA Police Force and PCYC Working Group was established. PCYC Executives and senior WA Police Force representatives meet monthly to support a collaborative exchange of ideas and approaches which seek to improve service delivery by both organisations.

In December last year, WA PCYC and the WA Police Force endorsed a new Partnership Model, highlighting shared objectives and a commitment to ongoing collaboration. Youth Policing Officers and other local police officers have increased their engagement with Centre Managers and young people attending programs to ensure positive outcomes for young people.

The WA Police Force continues its focus on diverting young people from entering the justice system. Working closely with the PCYC in each district under this partnership has resulted in increased opportunities for police officers to provide mentoring, guidance and referral support to young people who need it the most.

Reflecting on this year, there is much to celebrate. State Government grant funding has been allocated for redevelopment of PCYC facilities at the Rockingham and Midland PCYCs, additional to ongoing development projects currently underway in Kununurra, Carnarvon and Broome.

2019-20 recorded a 5.4% decrease in youth offending and after extensive internal reform and with support from the State Government, PCYC is now well-positioned, being actively supported by police officers, to continue helping the most vulnerable children and young people across the State.

I must acknowledge the leadership provided by the President of PCYC, Geoff Stooke OAM, who has effectively steered the organisation through a challenging year with the added complexities brought by the COVID-19 pandemic.

As I look to the year ahead, the WA Police Force and WA PCYC will continue to work in partnership with local communities to develop local solutions to enable young people to live their best lives.

I am confident that together we will continue to change the lives of young people in WA for the better, reducing crime and creating safer, more harmonious communities.

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# **PRESIDENT'S REPORT**

Each year brings its own challenges, and the challenges faced by PCYC and the community in 2020 were greater than any other year in recent times. They required unprecedented changes and decisions to be made that impacted on all aspects of our operations and activities.

However, whilst no one could have predicted the scale of change required due to COVID-19, it also revealed the resilience and determination of our people to continue delivering services to disadvantaged children and young people at risk across Western Australia.

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic and the associated economic and financial impacts, PCYC needed to undertake a comprehensive review of its operations and service delivery model. To ensure the long-term sustainability of PCYC some difficult decisions had to be made. These included:

- The temporary reduction in services and support by all Centres due to COVID-19 restrictions
- The closure of Centres in Exmouth, Serpentine, Harvey and Quairading
- The closure of the PCYC Mornington Adventure Camp
- The end of PCYC outreach activities.

It was a difficult time in the history of PCYC, but a necessary one to ensure we could remain viable into the future and to

provide essential programs and activities for the most vulnerable children and young people across WA.

The achievements this year would not have been possible without the support of the State and Federal Governments. In addition to the State Government's \$4m sustainability funding and \$5.7m investment in capital projects, JobKeeper helped to keep our valued employees engaged whilst PCYC experienced a significant reduction in recreational income whilst Centres were closed due to the COVID-19 restrictions.

#### Summary of 2019-20 Funding:

- Sustainability Funding: \$4m
- JobKeeper: \$1.3m
- Grant Funding: \$3m
- Kununurra PCYC: \$698,000 (Funding not yet fully expended)

# Other Capital Funding confirmed in 2019-20:

- Midland PCYC Upgrade: \$2.95m (Funding not yet fully expended)
- Rockingham PCYC Upgrade: \$2.86m (Funding not yet fully expended).

It is in times of adversity that communities come together, and this year has certainly cemented our role in society. Throughout the period of challenging restrictions due to COVID-19, PCYC continued to connect with vulnerable and disadvantaged children and young people, both through online methods and care packages delivered to families in need.

#### A summary of the year's highlights:

- Commenced Kununurra PCYC operations
- Secured 'Preferred Provider' status with the Department of Education
- Secured a major \$3m, 3-year partnership with the Department of Industry, Science, Energy and Resources
- In response to COVID-19, rapidly migrated the organisation's IT to cloud-based Microsoft Teams

 Introduced multiple business systems to improve efficiency, compliance and staff development.

Our partnership with the WA Police has gone from strength to strength, and it is only through our collaboration that so many great outcomes have been achieved across the state.

I would like to extend my appreciation to the Premier, the Minister for Police, the Commissioner of Police and all their respective staff who continue to assist PCYC.

I would also like to thank Paul Ferguson, who retired as a Director in August 2020 after serving on the PCYC Board for four years and being involved with PCYC for close to twenty years. Welcome to our new Board Member, Ron Alexander.

I must thank the Board for their continued support, and the commitment of our CEO, David van Ooran, and his Team for their efforts in steering the organisation through a tumultuous year. Most of all, I would like to thank all our staff and volunteers for their significant contributions and for showing such resilience through the challenges COVID-19 brought to our organisation. Our achievements and outcomes for young people this year are even more impressive considering the environment in which they were achieved.

Our thanks and appreciation are also extended to our various sponsors, partners and supporters. Without their ongoing support, PCYC would not be the organisation it is today.

I look forward to the year ahead, working further with the WA Police and the wider Western Australian community to deliver more services to keep children and young people active and engaged and on a positive life path.

2020 was an extraordinary year. I never thought I would see the day that we had to temporarily close our Centres. However, whilst it's been a challenging year, it has been heartwarming to see our people so committed to our mission and determined to find new ways to engage with vulnerable children and young people.

Despite the temporary closures, 2019-20 has been an incredible year of providing disadvantaged children and young people at risk with access to diversionary programs, recreational activities and alternative learning courses.

Prior to the COVID-19 closures, PCYC had a second year of attendance growth, with a record 11 locations running our key diversionary program safeSPACE™ and our Institute of Training continuing to grow, with nearly 8,000 attendances across eight Centres.

Thanks to support from the State Government I'm delighted that we've been able to extend our reach, establishing a presence in Kununurra and starting eight new Blue Light™ Units in remote and regional areas of Western Australia.

When reflecting on the achievements of the year, I must offer heartfelt thanks to all of our partners and supporters. PCYC would not be the organisation it is today without the continued support of the Western Australian community.

I would also like to thank the Board, Executive and Leadership teams as they have continued to guide our organisation forward to a position of strength and of course, our dedicated staff and volunteers for the positive impact they have on children and young people's lives every day. Despite the many challenges our teams faced this year, over 90% of our staff reported that they are dedicated to PCYC and enthusiastic about the work they do, for which I am truly thankful.

I look forward to the year ahead for so many reasons. Significant capital projects will see our Midland, Rockingham, Carnarvon and Broome Centres revitalised, new fundraising initiatives will be launched, and new business systems will drive greater efficiencies for the organisation.

Furthermore, 2021 will mark our 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary. This will be a time to reflect on the impact PCYC has had on so many young West Australian lives and a celebration of our achievements.

As we celebrate, we will continue to put children and young people at the centre of our decision-making, and our strategy will continue to be led by the needs of the most vulnerable in our society.

Together with the Western Australian Police Force and our wonderful program partners, we will continue to make sure children and young people feel valued, are listened to and have the opportunity to reach their potential.

The Western Australian Police and Community Youth Centres (WA PCYC) exists so that disadvantaged children and young people at risk across Western Australia have a safe place to go – somewhere they can feel at home, make friends and do things that children should do.

Whether through recreational activities, personal development programs or alternative learning opportunities, we make it our mission to help children reach their full potential.

Throughout 2019-20 we recorded over 243,000 attendances to our Centres across the state. Since we began in 1941, children and young people have joined PCYC for many reasons. Some children come to enjoy after school care activities, some seek comfort from challenging home or school environments, and

some are referred to PCYC by the Western Australia Police Force, the Department of Education or the Juvenile Justice System to take part in diversionary programs, alternative learning courses or just as a safe place to hang out.

Across WA, we're working hard to ensure there is a PCYC Centre or outreach activity where children need our services.

We're proud to have Centres across the state, from Albany to Broome and many in-between, partnering with the Police to serve the community and create opportunities for children and young people. We also support 35 Blue Light™ Units for children to access fun activities in a safe environment in remote and regional areas where there is no PCYC Centre.





# **BROOME**

Broome PCYC is a much-needed and well-loved part of the community. A vast range of activities are offered to children, young people and adults in the community, from diversionary programs, to alternative education and recreational activities.

Well-known for its safeSPACE™ Program, Broome PCYC is a favourite after school and evening hangout for young people, with a huge range of activities from basketball to football, cooking, help with homework and excursions.

Thanks to State Government funding, a \$1.3m redevelopment project is underway and due to be completed in 2021.

#### **NEW LOCATION**

In April 2019, the State Government announced that it would provide \$1.95m over three years to establish a Kununurra PCYC.

PCYC excitedly launched an outreach model in December 2019 and immediately engaged hundreds of children in Kununurra and Wyndham. Two Youth Police Officers support all activities.

Whilst in its early stages, the attendance rates surpassed the target, with hundreds of children and young people participating in activities weekly.

#### **GERALDTON**

Geraldton PCYC is one of our busiest Centres in the North West, with children and young people enjoying a range of recreational and diversionary programs free of charge.

Geraldton PCYC has a strong collaborative relationship with the WA Police and a range of community partners, including local Aboriginal organisations, to deliver the most appropriate services for the community.

Throughout 2019, Geraldton PCYC ran an amazing songwriting program, funded by CGG and Optus Music, linking young people with local language groups and Aboriginal artists.

Throughout the COVID-19 lockdown, Geraldton PCYC delivered care packs to disadvantaged children and families, containing essential daily items like toothpaste and soap plus some Easter treats.

### **NORTHAM**

Northam PCYC offers a vast range of sports and alternative education programs for young people, with food and transport home often included. The PCYC Drive to the Future program is also run at Northam, funded by the WA Police Force.

Northam PCYC delivers Stepping Stones – an alternative education program free of charge for young people in year 11 or 12 that for a variety of reasons are not attending school. Funded by the Department of Education, the course covers basic numeracy and literacy and many other topics including health and well-being, résumé writing, applying for jobs, computer skills and first aid, amongst others.

# **MIDLAND**

# **ROEBOURNE**

Located in the centre of Roebourne, surrounded by the only school, a pool and a basketball court, stands the Roebourne PCYC, also known as the '50 Cent' Hall. Located in a low socio-economic area, Roebourne PCYC relies solely on grant funding, corporate partnerships and local community support to provide a safe place for young people to participate in structured programs and activities.

With the support of Regional Development Australia, safeSPACE™ operates multiple evenings a week. A partnership with the Marwannkara Aboriginal Health Services also provides children and young people with access to a Nurse through select programs.



### **SUBIACO**

Subiaco PCYC is a vibrant Centre, renowned for its recreational activities, especially gymnastics, with several gymnasts reaching competition level each year.

Subiaco also runs a Certificate I in Leadership course for young people at risk and is home to Subiaco Police Rangers, a popular adventure-based program for children of high school age, funded by Cadets WA.

Gosnells PCYC is renowned for its Boxing and Judo programs, producing incredible sports outcomes. This year, eighteen-year-old Gosnells Judo Champion, Jordan Boxell, officially ranked number one in Australia in the junior men's under 66kg division.

# **QUAIRADING**

The Certificate I Automotive course, along with our Certificate II Metals and Engineering makes learning and development a key part of what the Centre does to engage young people at risk every day.

Rockingham PCYC has secured State funding for a \$2.86m upgrade which is scheduled for completion in 2021.

# MORNINGTON ADVENTURE CAMP



With over 27,000 attendances across 12 Centres, safeSPACE™ is our core diversionary program for vulnerable children and young people at risk.

Programs are run before school, after school and into the evening. The most

popular programs are after school, where some children come to enjoy the many activities on offer and others to avoid challenging home environments. Either way, safeSPACE™ creates a home away from home where young people can relax, make friends and be entertained when they might otherwise be bored and start to loiter or cause problems in community areas.


A huge range of activities are offered at safeSPACE™ programs, from basketball to bike riding, arts and crafts, cooking, help with homework, access to the PCYC Keys for Life program and more formal workshops. Opportunities that some children would never have access to otherwise.

Workshops are often the precursor to young people joining our accredited Institute of Training courses. Centre Managers determine the workshop content as they know the needs of the local children and the challenges that their community faces. Topics range from Aboriginal culture to protective behaviours, mental health, nutrition, money matters and employability skills, which includes personal grooming, communication, teamwork, CV writing and interview preparation.

When children and young people live too far to walk to a Centre, we provide transport to safeSPACE™ sessions, collecting them and taking them home at the end of the session. Sadly, many children come to our Centres hungry too, so we provide healthy snacks and dinner before transporting them home.

As well as providing a safe place for children and young people, the program plays a vital role providing access to a wider support network when needed. As young people build relationships with PCYC staff and trust them to talk to, this provides an avenue for PCYC to refer participants to other agencies and services that can help with issues such as mental health, family violence or drug abuse.

Each community is different, so each safeSPACE™ Program is different too. Where possible, we engage with the local Police and community to co-design activities so that our programs meet the needs of the local children.

As part of the Broome PCYC safeSPACE™ Program, staff and mentors from Indigenous and non-Indigenous backgrounds deliver a range of programs for some of the most vulnerable children and young people in the community; including a week boys night on Mondays, girls night on Thursdays, basketball on Friday nights and a boys group on Saturday or Saturday night — depending on the Broome tide!

Broome PCYC works closely with the WA Police Community Relations Officer, Monica Lee, to keep the community engaged with PCYC.

boys and girls nights, to arts and crafts, cooking, basketball till midnight on Friday nights to going out at the weekend re-connecting with country and catching mud crabs, there's something for everyone.

Children and young people can also see a future for themselves, looking up to Youth Worker Philip who progressed from a PCYC kid to graduating from PCYC Institute of Training courses, and ultimately to paid employment as a Youth Worker. Not to mention Centre Manager Annie Dann, who also used to attend Broome PCYC as a child.

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# **DIVERSIONARY PROGRAMS**

#### **DRIVE TO THE FUTURE**

In many Western Australian remote and regional towns, the only way to get to work is by car. So being able to drive is crucial. Unfortunately, getting a licence to drive is an expensive process, often out of reach for many young people. Thus, affecting their ability to gain employment and break the cycle of poverty and disadvantage.

The PCYC Drive to the Future Program ensures that more young drivers are safe and qualified to drive. In addition, by providing quality instruction and guidance to novice drivers, the program aims to improve overall community safety.

Young people are identified locally by the PCYC Centre Manager, in liaison with their local Youth Policing Officers. Drive to the Future is run in partnership with local WA Police teams and where possible Aboriginal organisations.

The program takes young people through the theory, practice and testing required to obtain their driver's licence.

#### **Activities include:**

- Driver education sessions (such as drug/alcohol awareness, defensive driving, and hazard identification/avoidance);
- Computerised theory test (to obtain Learner's Permit);
- Practical driving lessons;
- Hazard Perception Test;
- Further practical driving supervision;
- Practical Driving Assessment.

In 2019-20, the Drive to the Future Program was delivered at Northam and Rockingham PCYC thanks to the Western Australia Police Force Community Crime Prevention Fund, and at the Collie, Broome, Geraldton and Kensington PCYC, thanks to the Australian Government, Safer Communities Fund.

# **FULL THROTTLE**

Full Throttle is a bike rebuilding and restoring program for young people aged 12-18 years old, that are currently disengaged from school.

Young people work with volunteers who generously give their time to teach young people about bike mechanics and work with them to make the bikes roadworthy. Once they are in good condition, the participants donate the bikes back to the community or local families in need.

As well as teaching technical skills, the program aims to improve participants' respect for other people's property and to develop a connection to the community in which they live.

Delivered predominantly at Gosnells PCYC, the success of the program is attributed to the dedication of volunteers and PCYC life members. Local community organisations also support the program by providing financial assistance for tools and materials.

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# **BREAKFAST CLUB**

The sad reality for parents that can't afford to feed their children, is that 18% say their children go a whole day without eating anything at least once a week and one in five children go to school without eating breakfast at least once a week\*.

The relationship between food and mental health is well documented. Not consuming enough food causes psychological distress and severely affects children's ability to concentrate.

Thanks to the Fremantle Foundation and donors of Impact 100, Fremantle PCYC provide nearly 200 meals to children every month. In Rockingham, the Breakfast Club is funded by the WA Police and Department of Communities. Operating twice a week, over a hundred meals are provided to local children every month.

In addition to removing the barrier to learning when a child is hungry, the program provides young people with a safe environment where they can engage with Youth Workers and take part in other personal development or recreational activities before school. Young people engaged in the Breakfast Club are transported to school to increase attendance. This also benefits local communities with a reduction in anti-social behaviour.

# **SCHOOL HOLIDAY PROGRAMS**

In 2019-20 there were 6,452 attendances at PCYC School Holiday Programs across the state.

We know that many misdemeanours are born out of boredom, so keeping disadvantaged children and young people entertained during the school holidays is key to keeping them on the right path. By providing accessible School Holiday Programs, PCYC also aims to ease the pressure on low-income families to find interesting, age-appropriate activities for children and young people during holidays.

PCYC provides a range of diversionary and recreational holiday programs with a vast array of activities offered at both.

Activities vary from location to location and may include:

- sports carnivals
- adventure camps
- bushwalking
- paintballing
- life skills and
- visits to the movies, aquatic centres, museums and playgrounds.

Incursions and in-centre activities include:


- structured activities such as sports and recreational activities

# **BLUE LIGHT™ YOUTH ACTIVITIES**

Blue Light™ Youth Activity Units operate in remote and rural areas where there is no PCYC Centre. They are managed by Police Officers who organise activities for young people to have fun in a safe, supervised environment, away from negative influences such as drugs and alcohol. For many children, these activities are their only access to recreational equipment and social events.

In partnership with the Western Australia Police Force, there are currently 35 Blue Light™ Units across Western Australia offering a wide variety of activities.

As well as keeping children and young people active, Blue Light™ Youth Activity Units help prevent young people from engaging in anti-social behaviour or becoming a victim of crime because they are out unsupervised. Blue Light™ activities also build relationships between the WA Police and remote and regional communities.

Our aim is to build on the number of Blue Light™ Units throughout 2020-21 to reach as many disadvantaged children and young people as possible across the state.

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# **POLICE RANGERS**

Police Rangers is an adventure-based, youth development activity, funded by Cadets WA and operated jointly by the Western Australia Police Force and PCYC. Police Rangers is open to all young people of high school age — not just those interested in becoming a Police Officer.

Police Ranger Units operate at eight PCYC locations and select secondary schools throughout Western Australia. The program is structured on the Western Australia Police Force ranking system. Promotion is achieved when Police Rangers complete set tasks – providing participants with a sense of achievement.

The program is designed to increase self-confidence, team-building skills and self-esteem. Police Rangers learn first aid and other emergency skills and take part in bushcraft, survival procedures, abseiling, climbing, exploring, orienteering, drill techniques, archery, bushwalking, camping and much more.

Police Rangers also participate in excursions such as adventure camps where they use radio communication and undertake intensive physical training.

Furthermore, the training programs for First Class Ranger and Senior Ranger are currently endorsed by the School Curriculum



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# **ALTERNATIVE EDUCATION** & TRAINING



Our vision is to empower children and young people to reach their potential. We know that the fastest way to create parity for disadvantaged children is through education and sustainable employment opportunities.

However, for many reasons, some young people need alternative learning options to traditional school. Without effective alternatives, the future for many of these young people is uncertain, leading to a cycle of disadvantage. That's why we operate our Registered Training Organisation, rebranded in 2020 as the PCYC Institute of Training (IOT).

When young people between the age of 15-25 are disengaged from school or in the justice system, the Department of Education, the Western Australia Police Force, Juvenile Justice Teams and employment training agencies refer students to gain qualifications at PCYC. This is often a big turning point for young people, where they become comfortable in a safe learning environment, find their passions and for many gain their first certificate or qualification.

To minimise barriers to young people completing courses, PCYC also provides transportation to and from each Centre, as well as providing healthy meals.

The long-term goal of all PCYC Institute of Training courses is to provide young people with the skills and confidence to transition back into a school environment, or to progress to further education, training or employment.

Nothing makes us more proud than seeing young people graduate from Institute of Training courses and going on to secure employment, their lives forever turned around.

The PCYC Institute of Training operates at eight Centres; Broome, Bunbury, Gosnells, Kensington, Midland, Northam, Rockingham, and Subiaco.

PCYC Trainers also deliver courses at several metropolitan schools.

# **CERTIFICATE I IN AUTOMOTIVE VOCATIONAL PREPARATION**

AUR10116 - Provider No. 50901

Certificate I in Automotive Vocational Preparation provides young people that are disengaged from traditional school with an introductory qualification to pursue an Automotive/ Mechanical apprenticeship or a job in the automotive industry.

Currently delivered at Kensington, Midland and Rockingham PCYC, the 6-week course teaches students practical skills relevant to an automotive workplace.

Participants are also provided with a pick-up and drop-off service from nominated public transport locations, breakfast and lunch every day, PPE equipment, mentoring and assistance with their résumé when they graduate.

Students are referred from nominated agencies, including the Department of Justice, the Western Australia Police Force and the Department of Education.

Throughout 2019-20, 52 students graduated from Automotive I.

# CERTIFICATE II IN AUTOMOTIVE **VOCATIONAL PREPARATION**

AUR20716 - Provider No. 50901

Certificate II in Automotive Vocational Preparation is offered to students that complete Certificate I in Automotive Vocational Preparation.

Throughout this 12-week advanced course, students learn how to identify and inspect mechanical and electrical components and systems of automotive vehicles and equipment, as well as perform minor maintenance and repair to an automotive vehicle body.

In 2019-20, Certificate II in Automotive Vocational Preparation was run at Kensington PCYC, with 12 graduations.

After completing the course, students are qualified to apply for vehicle service assistant jobs or Automotive/Mechanical apprenticeships.

from Kensington PCYC Institute of Training and returned to school to complete year 12 and apply for entry into his local TAFE.

Earlier in 2019, Jack was skipping school and smoking marijuana. When he started to fall behind, Jack dropped out of year 11 entirely.

With no clear direction, or idea what to do next, Jack was referred to Kensington PCYC and enrolled into a 6-week Certificate I in Automotive Vocational Preparation course.

Seventeen-year-old Jack, who dropped out of year 11, graduated Throughout the course, Jack loved every part, learning how to strip engines, rebuild brakes and service cars.

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# ALTERNATIVE EDUCATION & TRAINING

#### **CERTIFICATE I IN LEADERSHIP**

52773WA - Provider No. 50901

Certificate I in Leadership is a 12-week bridging course that assists young people at risk to progress to further education, training or employment through developing employability and leadership skills and exposure to community participation.

Employability skills include learning how to deliver presentations, participating in brainstorming sessions, learning about health and safety in the workplace, and how to prepare a résumé and perform in job interviews.

All participants also take part in a community project to give back to those in need and have the opportunity to gain other qualifications such as the 'Provide First Aid' course and 'Keys for Life', a driver education program that promotes safe road use.

Certificate I in Leadership was delivered at Broome, Bunbury, Gosnells, Kensington, Midland and Subiaco PCYC, with 110 students enrolled throughout 2019-20.

#### PROVIDE FIRST AID

HLTAID003 – Provider No. 50901

This course offers an excellent grounding in first aid, equipping students with the skills and knowledge to provide first aid and management of a casualty until qualified help arrives.

Participants complete eight hours of pre-course online reading, plus a multiple-choice online assessment and eight hours of face-to-face training. This unit satisfies training requirements across a range of community and workplace settings.

# ABORIGINAL SCHOOL BASED TRAINING (ASBT)

Our vision is to help all children reach their full potential. Part of that goal involves helping to close the gap in education outcomes between Indigenous and non-Indigenous Australians.

From March 2019, PCYC delivered the Certificate I in Leadership as part of Aboriginal School Based Training to students in year 10. Locations included Duncraig and Warwick Senior High School, Aranmore Catholic College, Belmont City College and Hampton Senior High School. This training initiative forms part of the schools' Vocational Education and Training (VET) Program, in which PCYC Trainers deliver the course to 25 students, one day a week at each school, throughout the school year.

Eighteen-year-old Monique had one of the hardest starts in life, with an absent father and severe bullying at school that led to depression and anxiety.

Thankfully, PCYC was a constant in Monique's life since she was eight years old. A safe place that she could come to, be herself, enjoy a variety of activities and as a teenager seek friendship and comfort through her difficult school days.

Monique's road to recovery was long, but she soon became an inspiration to other children at PCYC, racking up many accolades including being a finalist in the Focus on Ability Film Festival and becoming the youngest female co-driver in the WA Rally Championships.

After graduating from the PCYC Institute of Training Leadership Course, Monique was inspired to complete a Certificate II in Security Operations and gain her First Aid Certificate.

She then went on to obtain her Security Officer, Crowd Controller and CCTV Control Room licence which led to getting her first job as a Security Officer, working for EON Protection.

Following this, Monique secured a permanent role with Main Roads in the Traffic Management division.

PCYC CEO, David van Ooran, said "Hearing stories like Monique's reminds us all of why we do what we do. Nothing is more rewarding than hearing of young lives completely turned around. We're all very proud of Monique."

Monique said, "Thank you PCYC for everything you've done for me and all the other kids that come to the Centre. I'm really proud of myself. It hasn't been easy, and I had some setbacks, but PCYC was always there when I needed help and advice. I couldn't have done it without you."

# **STEPPING STONES**

#### **CERTIFICATE I IN GENERAL EDUCATION FOR ADULTS**

22472VIC - Provider No. 50901

Funded by the Department of Education, Stepping Stones is an alternative education program free of charge for young people in year 11 or 12 that for a variety of reasons are not attending school.

In 2019 we were proudly identified as a preferred program supplier. Throughout the year, two variations of Stepping Stones were delivered at Midland and Northam PCYC.

As well as improving basic literacy and numeracy, Stepping Stones teaches young people basic life skills to improve self-confidence and reignite an interest in learning.

Throughout the course, Trainers also aim to identify issues that have caused disengagement to address any future barriers to learning and ensure long-term success.

# **WELD TO LIFE**

The Weld to Life course, delivered at Rockingham PCYC, consists of two components: Certificate I in Engineering and Certificate I in Wider Opportunities for Work.

#### **CERTIFICATE I IN ENGINEERING**

MEM10105 - Provider No. 50901

Certificate I in Engineering provides students with an opportunity to learn in a simulated industrial work environment. Students learn the basics of welding as a first step to a potential career as a boilermaker or in other careers where welding is a required skill.

During the course, students work as a team to build a large-scale project. This requires significant communication, planning, problem solving, initiative, teamwork and use of technology. Job opportunities include a pathway into further study within the engineering industry.

# **CERTIFICATE I IN WIDER OPPORTUNITIES FOR WORK**

52770WA – Provider No. 50901

Certificate I in Wider Opportunities for Work is an ideal stepping stone for entry into other certified training courses and a pathway into various vocational qualifications. Participants gain general educational support in literacy, maths, technology as well as study and general work-readiness skills.



# **RECREATIONAL ACTIVITIES**

Participating in sport teaches children and young people a multitude of skills including teamwork, listening and self-discipline. Other known benefits include increasing social inclusion, improving self-esteem, and enhancing physical and mental health.

Keeping children active has always been a core purpose of PCYC. As well as the health benefits, keeping young people engaged also keeps them away from negative influences and anti-social peer groups.

In 2019-20 PCYC offered a vast range of sports, from the traditional boxing, gymnastics and air rifles to an array of martial arts, basketball, football, soccer, bike riding and many more.

In addition to our fee-for-service, funding for PCYC sporting programs in 2019-20 came from the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries (DLGSC), to help young people get involved who might not otherwise have the opportunity to play sport.

# **GYMNASTICS**

Throughout 2019-20, PCYC recorded 53,569 attendances at gymnastics programs across 12 Centres. PCYC has a long-standing reputation for developing elite Gymnasts, and traditionally many of our gymnasts participate in state, national and international competitions. This year, however, fewer events went ahead due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

In November 2019, 41 gymnasts from our Subiaco, Kensington and Fremantle Centres travelled to Singapore as part of the WA PCYC Gymnastics team to compete in the Prime Gymnastics International Invitational. The team proudly placed second overall with some outstanding individual results, including several gymnasts taking first and second positions in a range of levels and age groups.

PCYC encourages children to enjoy gymnastics from a young age as it improves flexibility, co-ordination and fitness, and teaches personal discipline.

PCYC provides a range of classes from beginners to state and national squad levels, designed to allow children to progress appropriately, at their own pace.

# **RECREATIONAL ACTIVITIES**

# **BOXING**

Boxing has been a key activity at PCYC since it began as the Police Boys Club in 1941. Seventy-nine years later, in 2020, boxing is still as popular, with PCYC recording nearly 8,000 attendances across 11 Centres throughout 2019-20.

Proudly, three PCYC Centres are Boxing WA registered clubs, which allows them to participate at competitive Boxing WA events across the state. Almost 60% of PCYC Boxing attendances come from these clubs at Geraldton, Gosnells and Northam PCYC.

Boxing is a highly structured sport, which requires dedication and discipline. As well as improving cardiovascular fitness and muscle condition, it teaches important concepts like resilience and respect. The mental focus makes it a perfect sport for young people at risk, who can learn to harness their energy and use it in positive ways.

#### **AIR RIFLES**

Air Rifles ran at eight Centres throughout 2019-20 including Albany, Collie, Gosnells, Harvey, Kalgoorlie, Quairading, Rockingham and Fremantle PCYC.

Air Rifles is a competitive shooting sport that requires a high level of discipline, focus and patience. Participants shoot an air rifle at a target from a 10m distance in a standing or laying down position. Through practice and good coaching, participants develop their skills and complete specific safety requirements, in order to progress on to more challenging targets based on skill level.

Safety is paramount, so Air Rifles at PCYC is delivered by trained coaches who have their firearms licence and have completed courses in firearm safety and firearm range.

Traditionally, PCYC holds an annual Air Rifle Championship. Unfortunately, the 2020 event was cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic however we look forward to running the

# **MAJOR PROJECTS**

In late 2019, a Facilities and Asset Management department was established to oversee the effective operational management of all PCYC properties, buildings and infrastructure assets. The Facilities and Asset Management Team also managed four significant redevelopment projects throughout 2019-20.

# BROOME PCYC REDEVELOPMENT West Kimberley Youth and Resilience Hub

Thanks to Government funding of \$1.3m, a significant redevelopment of PCYC is underway. The first stage will enable renovation of the existing gym, basketball courts, kitchen, changing rooms and associated works.

The vision for Broome PCYC is to develop it into a true community youth hub, providing an inclusive and welcoming environment for all young people.

The future stages 2 and 3 will require significant further funding to fully develop the Centre into a community youth hub, involving a complete remake of the existing facilities, creating a new Alternative Education and Training Centre, new gym and boxing training facility, renovations to the existing indoor gymnasium, and rejuvenation of the existing oval to meet AFL Auskick standards.

#### **CARNARVON PCYC UPGRADE**

PCYC received significant government funding of \$1m for the repair and renovation of the Carnarvon Centre.

Carnarvon PCYC will relocate to the former premise of the Carnarvon Senior High School. Modifications to the existing site will allow for a standalone gymnasium, an undercover boxing area, alternative education spaces and new kitchen facilities. Works will ensure the new location can cater for the delivery of recreational activities, diversionary programs and accredited training courses for local children and young people.

#### MIDLAND PCYC REDEVELOPMENT

In December 2019, the Minister for Police and Road Safety, Hon. Michelle Roberts MLA, announced \$2.95m funding for the redevelopment of Midland PCYC.

This funding will enable the delivery of more programs and activities for disadvantaged children and young people at risk in the Midland area and beyond into Ellenbrook and Forrestfield. The redevelopment will include the construction of a new multipurpose hall, a large drop-in space. music studio and other multi-use spaces.

The funding will also provide for a new bus and garage.

# ROCKINGHAM PCYC REDEVELOPMENT

In January 2020, the Premier Hon. Mark McGowan MLA, announced \$2.86m funding to renovate and extend Rockingham PCYC.

The redevelopment will provide new activity spaces, a room to operate safeSPACE $^{TM}$ , an office for Youth Police Officers, a major upgrade and expansion of the existing skate park as well as a bus to transport young people to PCYC.

The number of residents in Rockingham is expected to grow significantly in the next decade with young people aged between 12-24 expected to increase by 10,600 by 2036.

Premier Hon. Mark McGowan MLA said, "Rockingham is one of the fastest-growing cities in the state and projects like this are vital to ensuring our infrastructure keeps up with population growth and demand."
