# >> MESSAGE FROM THE PATRON



For more than 80 years, the strong partnership between the Western Australia Police Force and the Police and Community Youth Centres (PCYC) has made a significant difference to disadvantaged young people at risk of offending. As the Commissioner of Police, I take pride in continuing to support the commendable work of PCYC throughout the Western Australian community.

Together with the WA Police Force, we are unwavering in our commitment to delivering engaging programs and activities that steer vulnerable youth away from a life of crime. This is achieved through our Youth Centres, providing a safe space for young people to learn new skills, make new friends and build healthy relationships.

In the current financial year, the organisation received \$4.45 million in sustainability funding to ensure the continued operation of its centres and the future viability of community programs.

The Rockingham PCYC Centre, which opened its doors in March, plays a vital role in delivering programs for young people at risk of reoffending. This multi-purpose facility offers a safe place for disengaged youth to undertake certified Vocational Educational Training and hosts a wide range of sporting and recreational activities for the broader community.

Through PCYC Centres and Blue Light WA™ Units, our Police Officers have the opportunity to build even more meaningful relationships with those within our community. The constructive interactions with vulnerable youth enable our officers to have a positive influence which earns their trust and respect.

I am particularly proud of the impact Police Officers are having in remote areas of WA through Blue Light WA™ Units. There have been over 12,000 attendees to events performed and organised for disadvantaged children, an increase of 70% over the previous 12 months.

Furthermore, I take great pride in the fact that Aboriginal people constitute 14% of

PCYC's workforce, significantly higher than the public sector average.

One of my top priorities is to enhance the safety of vulnerable young people and provide positive guidance to those at risk. The diversion pathways offered by PCYC are instrumental in keeping youth away from offending, arrest, the courts, and, ultimately, detention centres.

Lastly, I would like to express my sincere appreciation and gratitude to the PCYC Chairperson, Mr. Geoffrey Stooke, for his astute leadership.

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# >> CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

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2022-23 represented another year of positive progress, delivering much-needed diversionary and welfare programs to disadvantaged children and young people at risk across WA.

I am delighted to share the 2022-23 Annual Report.

2022-23 represented another year of positive progress, delivering much-needed diversionary and welfare programs to disadvantaged children and young people at risk across WA.

Our achievements across the state would not be possible without the incredible support of the Cook State Government. The \$18m sustainability funding which has continued to provide support for over four years, has afforded certainty for PCYC to deliver on its objectives.

I would like to extend my appreciation to the Minister for Police, Commissioner of Police and all their respective staff who continue to assist PCYC. Our partnership with the WA Police has gone from strength to strength, and it is only through our collaboration that we can have a lasting impact on young lives.

Further State Government capital investment of \$2.86m funding enabled the redevelopment of the Rockingham PCYC, proudly re-opened by the former Premier, Mark McGowan in March 2023. With the new activity spaces, two new classrooms, a courtyard and office space for Youth Police Officers to co-locate, the new facility will ensure PCYC can continue to deliver vital programs that are much needed in a growing community.

In August 2023, the Minister for Police, Hon. Paul Papalia CSC MLA, announced \$4.6m funding over two years for PCYC to continue its core diversionary program, safeSPACE™ in five locations: Broome, Bunbury, Carnarvon, Geraldton, and Gosnells.

The free referral-based program provides at-risk youth with access to a secure location and warm meals, as well as educational and recreational activities they may not otherwise experience.

SafeSPACE™ delivers more than 300 hours of safe and important education and development activities for young people in these five locations.

The Cook State Government already funds safeSPACE™ in Collie and Kununurra. The Commonwealth Government continues to financially support the program in Kalgoorlie and Roebourne, with safeSPACE™ operating seven days a week in Roebourne thanks to funding from Regional Development Australia five days a week and Rio Tinto for two days

Whilst we continue to increase our impact and reach year on year, the last twelve months was not without its challenges. As for most employers, labour market pressures presented challenges throughout the year, particularly in regional WA. However, PCYC has implemented initiatives to remain competitive whilst continually improving our approach to staff retention.

I would like to thank our new CEO, Peter Tranter, for his leadership and mobilising the organisation and making necessary changes for PCYC to achieve its purpose.

I would especially like to thank all of our staff and volunteers for their significant contribution and dedication to improving the lives of so many young people across our state.

Lastly, I would like to extend my thanks to my fellow Board members for generously giving their time to provide critical direction and governance.

I look forward to the year ahead, working with the WA Police and the community to reach more children that need our services. More than ever, we are well-positioned to continue helping the most vulnerable children and young people who need our services.

# >> CEO'S REPORT

At PCYC, our mission is clear. To support and empower disadvantaged children and young people at risk across Western Australia.

We know success is best achieved through collaboration. Our continued impact across the State wouldn't be possible without our strong partnership with the WA Police, support from the Federal and State Government and meaningful relationships with communities, businesses and like-minded agencies.

Fostering partnerships has been a key focus throughout 2022-23. PCYC has long-standing relationships with over 30 Aboriginal corporations and organisations to co-design programs and receive direct referrals to our programs.

I must thank the State Government for its continued support. PCYC received \$4.45 million in sustainability funding in 2022-23, which assisted with the ongoing operation of PCYC centres and the general fiscal ability of the organisation. The sustainability funding provides the foundation for PCYC to engage at-risk children and young people participating in diversionary programs, alternate education and training.

Furthermore, \$1.9m additional program funding was secured in 2022-23 from a range of corporations, NGOs and community organisations.

2022-23 has been a year of growth and transformation.

It was wonderful to officially reopen our Rockingham Centre in March this year. The upgraded centre will benefit hundreds of local children and young people who attend every week.

To further focus on at-risk youth and support the WA Police in diverting young people from the criminal justice system, a Youth Services division was established as part of an evolution from a location-based structure to a function-based structure.

Towards the end of 2022-23, we relaunched the PCYC Institute of Training (IOT) following an independent review. The new model is unique as the only Registered Training Organisation in WA to support students disengaged from learning with a qualified Youth Worker and a Trainer. Combined with the wrap-around support of transport and meals, the IOT courses give students the best chance of success.

2022-23 also saw considerable, sustained growth in Blue Light WA™ attendances across the State, with a 70% increase in events and an additional ten units established in remote areas.

A range of impressive sporting accolades were achieved this year, including PCYC gymnasts attending the 2023 Prime Gymnastics Invitational competition in Singapore, a Collie FreeG participant Oscar Stanley attending the Ninja Challenge League Finals in Melbourne, and Geraldton PCYC boxing participant Frauke Rawlings winning the Golden Gloves Championship in Brisbane.

PCYC has actively worked to achieve its Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) commitments, and I'm particularly proud that 14% of the PCYC workforce identifies as Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander. This is a 9% increase from the time of publishing our first RAP in May 2022.

Looking forward, we will constantly seek to improve in all areas of our organisation. Sourcing new funding partners is a priority, and opportunities for collaboration to co-design and co-deliver more programs will be explored, as well as strategic partnerships.

2023-24 will see the completion of a major capital project in Midland. As one of the first centres that opened in 1941, it is integral to the community and will be a vibrant hub for recreational activities, diversionary programs and a source of alternative education programs for young people.

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# **>> MAJOR PROJECTS**

# **ROCKINGHAM PCYC REDEVELOPMENT**

The former Premier, Hon Mark McGowan MLA officially reopened Rockingham PCYC on Friday 24th March 2023 in the presence of the Minister for Police, Hon Paul Papalia CSC MLA; Mayor of the City of Rockingham, Deb Hamblin; CEO of the City of Rockingham, Michael Parker; and many other dignitaries and local stakeholders.

Thanks to the State Government's funding of \$2.86m, the upgraded centre is now benefitting hundreds of local children and young people who attend every week. The renovations included two new activity spaces, two new classrooms, an indoor/outdoor courtyard, and office space for Youth Police Officers to co-locate.

Rockingham PCYC has been a central part of the community for many years. As well as providing a variety of sport and recreational activities, Rockingham PCYC provides vital programs for young people at risk, and certified Vocational Educational Training through our unique Registered Training Organisation for young people who are disengaged from school.

# MIDLAND PCYC **REDEVELOPMENT**

The Midland PCYC redevelopment faced lengthy delays following the COVID-19 pandemic; however, following extensive value management, PCYC entered into a contract with Sanpro Construction in January 2023 and the project is now fully underway.

New classrooms and the reception area are complete, and the new sports court, workshop and car park are under construction, with an estimated completion date of January 2024.

# >> ABOUT US

PCYC has been an essential part of the WA community for over 80 years, supporting some of the most vulnerable children and young people in our society.

Whilst originally established to provide mentors for boys growing up during the war, PCYC has evolved to play a critical role providing culturally appropriate and safe support to disadvantaged children and young people at risk, as well as providing a trusted place in the community for children to take part in a range of sports and recreational activities.

With six owned buildings and 10 long-term leases, PCYC has solid foundations in each community in which it operates.

Collaboration is key to PCYC's success. Throughout 2022-23, PCYC partnered with over 30 Aboriginal corporations and Aboriginal organisations to co-design and support delivery of our programs, with many also providing direct referrals.

PCYC also partners with like-minded agencies and regional organisations across WA to enrich the experiences of young people – including Ngala, Centrecare, Football West, Shooting Stars, Fair Game, Helping Minds and many Local Government Authorities.

Our robust partnerships build capacity and, most importantly, provide at-risk young people with a wider support network to access the services they need.

Throughout 2022-23, we recorded over 302,286 attendances to our Centres and in excess of 10,000 attendances to Blue Light WA™ events. The number of attendances grows year-on-year – as does our impact across the state. In line with our mission, we'll continue to work hard to make sure there is a PCYC Centre or Blue Light WA™ Unit wherever children need our services.

# **BUNBURY**

#### **Employment pathways**

PCYC is proud to provide opportunities for young people to learn new skills, especially when students are disengaged at school.

Bunbury PCYC partnered with Bunbury Coffee to deliver a Barista Coffee Training program, enabling 30 young people to gain qualifications, increase their confidence and bolster their CV.

At the end of the course, the newly-qualified Baristas got to put their skills to the test. It was a real highlight when the students delivered a perfect flat white to the local Youth Police Officers – their sense of pride was palpable. All of the students were proud to gain real work experience, with several inspired to apply for jobs in hospitality.



# **CARNARVON**

# A Cinderella moment for Carnarvon children

For young people in Carnarvon, opportunities to get dressed up for special occasions are limited.

For NAIDOC Week, PCYC hosted a special NAIDOC Ball for children and young people to celebrate their culture.

In-kind donations flooded in from community members, providing young people with stunning outfits to wear on the night, as well as assistance with make-up and hair styling to ensure everyone felt their best.

Accompanied by parents, grandparents and guardians, the ball-goers beamed proudly as they enjoyed the spectacular community event; deemed as the highlight of the town's NAIDOC celebrations.



# **FREMANTLE**

# PCYC Gymnasts reach State Championships

The State Championships is one of the most important dates in the PCYC Gymnastics calendar.

Gymnastics has been a core part of PCYC's history, and we're proud to support young people from all demographics to reach their sporting potential.

Over 200 gymnasts attended the 3-day competition. It was a highly anticipated event, after children had tirelessly practised their moves and honed their routines for over a year.

The outcome was superb – with gymnasts that had grown from beginners showcasing phenomenal talent on the apparatus and the floor.

The spirit of camaraderie permeated the event, demonstrating the impact that taking part in a sport can have on young people.



# **GERALDTON**

# Rapping to a new beat

Young people in Geraldton were given a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to write, rap and record their own songs in a professional music studio with Lawrence Edwards from Strikat Music.

The initiative formed part of the new rap music program made possible by Geraldton PCYC, the Northern Agricultural Catchments Council WA, WA Police and Bundiyarra.

The lyrics featured English and Aboriginal language, giving young people the opportunity to experience this unique process whilst connecting to culture.

Whilst the emphasis was on the fun side of music production, the sessions were educational, too, with students challenged to write lyrics around the dangers and impact of rock-throwing in the community.



# **KUNUNURRA**

# Coming out of the shadows

In collaboration with Kununurra Warriors Boxing Club, headspace and Boab Health, PCYC delivered the 'Coming out of the Shadows' boxing program.

The outcome was incredible, with a visible difference in the girls' self-esteem and confidence.

As well as improving cardiovascular health and building strength, the boxing sessions acted as a great stress reliever and the girls reported that it improved their feelings of safety.

The program also provided an opportunity for girls to yarn with community members, the focus of conversations being on health education.



# **ROEBOURNE**

#### Sport in the regions

Pathways into sports programs are limited in remote locations, so PCYC partnered with Global Roaming Pilbara to establish a Basketball Academy for young people in Roebourne.

As well as providing professional coaching, the program taught the children about healthy living, covering topics like diet and exercise and educating them about the dangers of drugs and alcohol.

Over 30 children attended the sessions, and by the end of the program, they had learned far beyond the basics, gaining knowledge about rules, ball handling skills, dribbling and in-game plays.

The academy also enabled PCYC staff to connect with young people in a different setting, using sport as a bridge for difficult discussions and a chance to build positive connections.

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# >> SAFESPACE™



With over 41,000 attendances at ten Centres throughout 2022-23, safeSPACE™ is our core program for vulnerable children and young people at risk. Between October 2020 and September 2022, 89% of attendance was from Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander children.

Programs run before school, after school and into the evening creating a home away from home where young people can relax, make friends and take part in educational and recreational activities that many would not otherwise experience.

SafeSPACE™ gives young people a break from challenging home environments and allows them to build relationships with qualified youth workers and cultural leaders.

SafeSPACE™ is designed to eliminate almost all barriers to engagement, with transport provided to and from the sessions, plus breakfast and evening meals.

A huge range of activities and workshops are offered at safeSPACE™ Programs – from sport to music, art, cooking and

educational workshops. PCYC partners with a range of regional organisations to enrich sessions with incursions, excursions and specialist workshops.

As well as providing a safe place for children and young people, the program plays a vital role providing access to a wider support network. As young people build relationships and trust with staff, it provides an avenue for PCYC to refer participants to other agencies and services that can help with issues such as mental health, family violence or drug abuse.

# Fishing trips foster connection to Country

Kununurra PCYC runs safeSISTAS™, a group where girls create strong relationships with their friends and female role models.

SafeSISTAS™ in Kununurra is led by two local Indigenous Youth Workers, and alternates each week between a youth hub session or a bush trip that involves activities such as fishing, swimming or kayaking.

For the girls, the benefits of fishing go far beyond taking home some fresh fish for dinner. It offers a break from the pressures of everyday life and provides an opportunity for the girls to connect to Country.



# Young people find their voice

For many safeSPACE™ participants, learning to play a musical instrument is cost-prohibitive.

Thanks to safeSPACE™, teens at Bunbury PCYC had the chance to try a range of instruments and the benefit of a professional mentor to teach them how to write lyrics and the steps of songwriting.

As well as creating a unique opportunity for students to access music lessons, the sessions teach alternative methods of self-expression for teenagers facing challenging situations.



# Celebrating Christmas Kimberley style!

For many children in regional communities, celebrating Christmas with traditional activities like opening presents or enjoying extensive feasts is not possible.

Thanks to Kununurra PCYC, young people enjoyed a special Christmas together, decorating trees Kimberley-style (with decorations made of boab, kurrajong and kapok), playing games and enjoying a special Christmas dinner.

Part of what makes PCYC special is creating memories that children can treasure into adulthood.



# >> SAFESPACE™ HOLIDAY!



School holidays are a time when disadvantaged children are even more in need of activities to keep them safe, active and to decrease the risk of offending.

PCYC provides a range of activities, incursions and excursions thanks to generous funding from the State Government and local communities.

#### **Positive connections**

PCYC enables relationships to be built between Police Officers and vulnerable children so that they trust and respect Police, rather than shy away.

SafeSPACE™ school holiday programs provide an opportunity for Youth Police Officers to join activities such as kayaking, fishing and sports tournaments.



# Community collaboration leaves a mark

Balanggarra and Yolngu artist Molly Hunt created a 15-metre mural over six days after consultation with young people during safeSPACE™ holiday sessions at Kununurra PCYC. Children suggested key cultural themes for the artwork, such as basketball, music, fishing, dancing, sunsets, boabs, and the locals' favourite snack, salty plums.

"The mural is a direct representation of Kimberley Indigenous youth, designed in direct consultation with them by a young local Indigenous artist and painted by them. # >> DRIVE TO THE FUTURE



Our vision is to empower young people to reach their potential. We know that the fastest way to create parity is through meaningful and sustainable educational and employment opportunities. However, in many Western Australian remote and regional towns, the only way to get to work is by car – so being able to drive is crucial.

Unfortunately, getting a licence to drive is an expensive and challenging process, often out of reach for many at-risk young people. Thus, affecting their ability to gain employment and break the cycle of poverty and disadvantage.

The PCYC Drive to the Future (DTTF) Program is an intensive program for people who are identified locally by the PCYC Centre Manager or Youth Police Officers.

Drive to the Future includes the theory, practice and testing required to obtain a learner's permit and driver's licence, ensuring more young people are safe and qualified to drive. In addition, the program aims to improve road and community safety by ensuring participants successfully achieve each required stage of their learning as part of WA's Graduated Driver Training and Licensing system, focusing on driving in accordance with road laws, hazard identification and safe driving practices.

However, the program is not only about driver training.

Gaining their driving licence also increases young people's self-esteem, employability, and therefore general well-being and mental health.




# Wrap-around support

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# >>> BLUE LIGHT WA™

Blue Light WA™ Units are managed in partnership between PCYC and the Western Australia Police Force.

Thanks to annual philanthropic funding of \$250k since August 2020, Blue Light WA™ has grown from 37 Units in 2020-21 to 60 Units in 2022-23.

Units are facilitated by the WA Police and supported by local community members and organisations who facilitate activities and events where children and young people can have fun in a safe, supervised environment.

For many children living in remote areas of WA, these activities are their only access to social and recreational events.

As well as keeping children and young people engaged,
Blue Light WA™ Units help increase positive relationships
between Police, youth, and communities and reduce young
people's involvement in anti-social behaviour and crime.

Blue Light WA™ activities are broad – Police engage with children and young people by hosting discos, pool parties, sports games, movie nights and other family events.

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

Since the Bidyadanga Blue Light WA™ Unit was established, local children and young people have loved attending events such as pool parties, movie nights, fishing trips and discos organised by local Police Officers.

Bidyadanga is located on the Kimberley coast, 1,590 kilometres north of Perth and 180 kilometres southwest of Broome. It is the largest remote Aboriginal community in WA, with a population of approximately 850 residents. It is home to the Karajarri, Juwalinny, Mangala, Nyungamarta and Yulpartja language groups.

The first Blue Light WA™ Disco in 2021 was a huge success with over 160 children and young people attending. The demand for activities to keep kids engaged and active has continued to grow, with over 1,000 attendances recorded at Blue Light WA™ events in Bidyadanga in the last twelve months.

Currently facilitated by Brevet Senior Sergeant Michael Sedgman and Brevet Sergeant Lani Cremer, Bidyadanga Blue Light WA™ events cater to the community's high percentage of young residents.

Officer Cremer said, "We are really fortunate to have support from stakeholders in the community, and we are so grateful for Blue Light WA<sup>TM</sup> providing these opportunities."

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# >> ALTERNATIVE EDUCATION & TRAINING





Our vision is to empower children and young people to reach their potential. We know that some young people need alternative learning options to traditional school. Without effective alternatives, the future for many of these young people is uncertain, leading to a cycle of disadvantage. So, the PCYC Institute of Training acts as a stepping stone, helping to guide young people to a positive path.

When young people between the ages of 15-25 are disengaged from school or have entered the justice system, the Department of Education, the Western Australia Police Force, Juvenile Justice Teams and employment training agencies refer students to gain qualifications at PCYC.

This is often a major turning point for young people, when they become comfortable in a safe learning environment, find their passion and, for many, gain their first certificate or qualification.

To minimise barriers to young people completing courses, PCYC also provides transportation to and from each Centre. as well as providing healthy meals.

The long-term goal of all PCYC Institute of Training courses is to provide young people with the skills and confidence to transition back to a school environment, or to progress to further education, training or employment.

Nothing makes us more proud than seeing young people graduate from Institute of Training courses and go on to secure employment - their lives forever turned around.

This course is an introductory qualification to automotive retail, service and repair industries and an entry to further training in many sectors.

Certificate I in Automotive Vocational Preparation provides young people that are disengaged from traditional school with an introductory qualification to pursue an Automotive/Mechanical apprenticeship or a job in the automotive industry. Participants are provided with a pick-up and drop-off service from nominated public transport locations, breakfast and lunch every day, personal protective equipment, mentoring and assistance writing their résumé.

Students are referred from nominated agencies, including the Department of Justice, the Western Australia Police Force and the Department of Education.

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# >> RECREATIONAL ACTIVITIES

# Sport and recreational activities have been at the heart of PCYC since our inception in 1941.

Over the years, PCYC has produced many elite athletes and been the start of many successful sporting careers.

2022-23 has been no different, with many PCYC prodigies competing at regional, national and international competitions.

PCYC is committed to creating an inclusive environment, and offers a wide range of recreational activities including Aikido, FreeG, Gymability and Yoga.

Some recreational activities are fee-for-service with income helping to support our mission-based activities, while others are funded by the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries, to help involve young people who might not otherwise have the chance to play sport.

To ensure all children and young people have the opportunity to participate in community sport, all Centres are registered as a 'KidSport Club' and accept vouchers for a range of recreational activities.

# **GYMNASTICS**

PCYC is renowned for its exceptional gymnastics coaching. Coupled with a range of pathways to suit every age and ability, Gymnastics is one of the most popular recreational activities at PCYC.

Throughout 2022-23, over 2,000 children attended PCYC gymnastics classes, with the option to join recreational classes, take part in PCYC state competitions or progress to Gymnastics WA state levels.

# **KINDERGYM**

KinderGym is run at nine PCYC Centres, including Albany, Bunbury, Collie, Fremantle, Gosnells, Kalgoorlie, Kensington, Northam and Subiaco.


KinderGym is a Gym WA approved toddler play program that is specifically designed for children aged 0-5. As well as a recognised pathway into gymnastics, KinderGym is packed with activities to develop motor skills, musicality and rhythm.


KinderGym classes are designed to develop physical literacy in the whole child – socially, emotionally, and cognitively. The classes also provide the opportunity for parents and carers to be involved in their children's gym time, under the guidance of qualified instructors.

The program involves a fun mix of music, dance, hand apparatus (like ribbons and scarves), musical instruments, obstacle courses, tumbling and age-appropriate gymnastic skills. All of which help develop fine and gross motor skills as well as gain confidence in the world around them.

# **AIR RIFLES**

Air Rifles ran at six Centres throughout 2022-23, including Albany, Collie, Fremantle, Gosnells, Kalgoorlie, and Rockingham PCYC.

Air Rifles is a competitive shooting sport that requires a high level of discipline, focus and patience. Participants shoot an air rifle at a target from a 10m distance in a standing or lying down position.

Through practice and strong coaching, participants develop their skills and complete specific safety requirements in order to progress to more challenging targets based on skill level.

Safety is paramount, so Air Rifles at PCYC is delivered by trained coaches who have their firearms licence and have completed courses in firearm safety and firearm range.

### **BASKETBALL**

Basketball is a popular sport at PCYC, from informal streetball played in outdoor courts to structured three-on-three games, holiday clinics and large-scale community events.

PCYC children in Broome and Carnarvon have been fortunate throughout 2022-23 to meet with Perth Wildcats players and even have an afternoon playing basketball with the stars.

Basketball is also a popular sport at Blue Light WA™ Units. '3-Point Fridays' is an initiative started by the Merredin Blue Light WA™ Unit, where young people come together every Friday for free basketball sessions and matches.

PCYC also takes part in the well-known introductory basketball program, Aussie Hoops. With over 200 participants attending the Bunbury PCYC Aussie Hoops, it is the largest program in Regional WA. In July 2023, Bunbury PCYC was recognised for its significant involvement, winning the Basketball WA 'Participation Program of the Year' award.

# **BOXING**

Boxing has been a key activity at PCYC since it began as the Police Boys Club in 1941. Many WA Boxing legends began their career or coached at PCYC, including Bunbury PCYC's long standing volunteer, the late Bill Ivory OAM.

Now, in 2023, boxing is still as popular, with PCYC recording over 5,300 attendances across seven Centres throughout 2022-23.

Boxing is a highly structured sport, which requires dedication and discipline. As well as improving cardiovascular fitness and muscle condition, it teaches important concepts like resilience and respect. The mental focus makes it a perfect sport for young people at risk, who can learn to harness their energy and use it in positive ways.

In the past year alone, her achievements have been nothing short of extraordinary. Frauke began 2022 by winning a Junior Sports Star Award, as part of the Geraldton Guardian's Mid-West Sports Awards. This was swiftly followed by receiving the title of Golden Gloves Champion at the Golden Gloves Tournament held in Brisbane in August.

Frauke's accomplishments have recently extended to representing Western Australia in the State team, becoming the first junior female amateur boxer from Geraldton to make the team in over two decades.

Frauke also finds the time to volunteer at Geraldton PCYC to teach Junior Boxing.

Her achievements have not gone unnoticed. In recognition of her leadership and achievement in sport, education and volunteering, Frauke garnered sponsorship from the City of Greater Geraldton to take part in the Youth Explorer Voyage, sailing from Fremantle Port.

Frauke is the perfect example of children and young people exploring their talents and finding their passion at PCYC. We can't wait to see where Frauke's boxing journey takes her next.

# **VACATION CARE**

Six of our Centres provided fee-for-service holiday activities and Vacation Care programs throughout 2022-23, with over 11,000 attendances across Albany, Bunbury, Fremantle, Gosnells, Kalgoorlie and Kensington.

Developing physical, cognitive and

emotional skills through incursions, excursions and structured play

Activities vary from holiday programs with set activities, incursions and excursions to dedicated 'have a go' one-off sport trial days. All activities are designed to keep children active and engaged, with the emphasis on participation and having fun.

Every PCYC community is unique, so we tailor programs to the needs of each community and make sure that every holiday program is different from the last. We also know that children need some down time, so we make sure there are always spaces for children to relax and feel at home.

Safety is paramount, so we ensure our programs are safe and age appropriate, with a junior and senior program running each day.

# >> OUR PEOPLE

PCYC has a rich history in WA, and the diversity of our people, from employees to volunteers and life members, reflect that rich tapestry.

Supporting disadvantaged children and young people at risk is undoubtedly one of the most rewarding roles, so it's not surprising that 16% of employees have worked at PCYC for over five years.

Throughout 2022-23, PCYC evolved from a location-based structure to a function-based structure. Critically, this included the establishment of a Youth Services division to focus on diversionary programs and alternative education.

#### **RECONCILIATION ACTION PLAN**

PCYC launched its first 'Reflect' **Reconciliation Action Plan in May** 2022, so 2022-23 was the first year of delivering outcomes against the key action areas of Relationships, Respect, Opportunities, **Governance and Reporting.** 

PCYC has long held strong connections with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, partnering with Aboriginal corporations to co-design programs, and many centres having close to 100% attendance by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children.

One of PCYC's commitments is to improve employment outcomes for Aboriginal and Torres Straight Islander people. Throughout 2022-23, PCYC is proud to report a 14% indigenous employment rate, an increase of 5% since the RAP was published. As an indication of success, the Workforce Diversification and Inclusion Strategy for WA Public Sector Employment

2020-2025 aims to increase the representation of Aboriginal people employed in the sector to 3.7%.

As a provider of programs and activities to many Aboriginal children and young people across the state, we appreciate and value the role PCYC can play in creating a reconciled Australia, where Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children will have the same life chances and choices as non-Indigenous children.

Through our RAP, we are determined to develop our cultural competency and strengthen cultural security in the communities in which we operate.



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# >> VOLUNTEERS

Our community centres are part of the fabric of local communities. A place where generation after generation have played sports, spent Friday nights at discos and celebrated special events.

As such our volunteers are diverse in their age, background and the skills they share. From PCYC participants who want to give back to younger children to qualified coaches, we're grateful for every hour generously given volunteering at our Centres.

Many of the children and young people we work with don't have a strong family support network, so PCYC provides a place for them to build relationships and connect with their community. We become a home away from home, and often those life-changing connections are made with people who give their time so generously to help young people reach their potential.
